



#### **Martley History**

# The Nellists in Martley August 1960s:

#### Harvesting at Horsham Farm

August was another busy month at Horsham Farm, the time for harvesting the corn. When he thought it was ready Dad would pick a few samples from the fields of wheat, oats and barley and take them down to Ankerdine Farm where the Walkers would test them in a humidifier. to confirm. Then the big combine harvester would be driven to Horsham. only just managing to pass through the four wooden gates along the farm track beside the River Teme - and several days of intense combining would commence. In the early 1960s the combine was an old red machine where the driver sat perched above and just behind the wide rotating front spindle but later it was replaced by a modern yellow 'New Holland' with a protective dustproof cab and additional safety features. There were several large corn fields to harvest. It was often a dusty job and I remember the agreeable dry chaff smell associated with the work. Especially if there was the threat of rain the men worked late into the night, operating only by the headlights on the combine and accompanying tractor.

The resulting grain was transported in a high-sided metal trailer and stored on the top floor of the hop kilns, to be taken away in bulk later. (As young children, my brother Stewart and I liked to jump and play in the piles of grain there, until Dad stopped us). Once the combining was completed the straw would be baled - it was another big machine activity that fascinated us boys. Sometimes we would ride on the sled that dragged behind the baler, where a stack of six or more straw bales were collected and released for later transportation to the barns. Rarely in our Horsham years was the stubble burnt. One year, Dad fell off the top of the large trailer where he was loading straw bales; he suffered a nasty bump and was otherwise unhurt but Stewart (who was helping with the work) only told us about that incident many years later since Dad did not want Mum or me to worry about him. I can just remember the old tractor drawn reaper/harvester that was in use on the Farm in the 1950s before the fully automated combines arrived. Other harvesting memories are of Stewart and I climbing up onto the driver's seat of the combines after the daily work had finished (to us children they were the largest moving machines we had ever seen) and of the multitude of glorious red poppies that grew in the corn fields before it became fashionable to spray insecticides. Another memory is of the aerial spraying of the crop much earlier in the year, when an aeroplane would descend on the Farm and fly many passes over the growing corn; to aid the pilot's identification, a man came out to the farm the day before and placed four red flags in the corners of each of the fields to be sprayed.

Late August was the time for picking blackberries, which Mum baked into



delicious blackberry and apple pies. Although it was a prickly and staining activity, I quite enjoyed

foraging for the berries in the brambles and hedgerows around the farm. August was the month too for the Madresfield show at Malvern. As well as the animal judging and other farming aspects, that one day event had the added attraction of the historic house, moat, gardens and maze. It was an occasion for us to meet up with other family members and to enjoy a showground picnic. August was also the month to make essential preparations for the hectic three weeks of hop-picking in September. There might be one last spraying of the hop bines (water was fetched from the Teme but one year the student driver misjudged the distance to the river bank and the tractor and spraying trailer cartwheeled down into the water. It necessitated a two-day crane rescue). Tom Hadley and Dad would spend a week or more servicing the large Bruff hop picking machine that occupied one of the open Dutch barns adjoining the rickyard. There was much greasing to do of oily parts and heavy rubber belts equipment and other pieces disassemble, clean and reassemble before the machine was given several trial runs. The pit where the hops were bagged had to be emptied of the water that had accumulated in it throughout the year; the drying kilns and sulphur burners were readied and serviced: and the 'kip' where the men would rest in between their night shifts also had to be erected. Lastly, Dad would recruit casual labour to work on the hop-picking machine. Most were seasonal regulars who lived locally at Berrow Green (Frank and Mrs Freeman and the Collins twins), Newtown/Wants Green (Alf Sims, with his distinctive old sliding side-door green 'Commer' van), Collin's Green (Tom and Beatty Powell, Mrs Rae and Mrs Kenley), Easinghope (Fred Davis) and Ankerdine (Alan Morris). There were other helpers too (such as Mary Adams, Bob Tyson and Tom Bullock) and in the 1950s and early 1960s a few families of traveller gypsies arrived for the work. An account of the hop-picking will be included in next month's magazine.

#### **Pudford Lane**

Already the year seems to be flying by, our few fruit trees in the garden are looking quite promising, the plums are beginning to ripen and our new pear tree has got more pears on it this year. I can look forward to a few apple crumbles as the apple crop looks good as well. We are definitely not the Monty Don of Pudford Lane when it comes to gardening and certainly nowhere near Harry King's skills at producing home grown fruit and

vegetables although he did give me some runner beans one year and I found a Tesco price tag on them! We never seem to have any spare time to spend in the veg garden although we usually manage to produce a reasonable number of tomatoes and runner beans which are my favourite vegetables. I also like my mixed salad leaves as you can keep picking a few leaves when you want them. I've only heard the cuckoo twice this year, once at home and once at some friends who live by Cleobury Mortimer. How fast things are changing, going back forty to fifty vears ago. (I know. I can't believe how the years have flown by, so when people like Dave Bradley or Len Hoskins tell you they are 42, don't believe them!) you heard the cuckoo any time after 11th April and it always caused much excitement if you were the first to hear the cuckoo in your area. Another noticeable thing this year are the fewer number of swallows about. Years ago, if you were in the hay field in the late evening, it was a joy to watch the large numbers of swallows swooping across the field after the insects. I used to love loading bale trailers on what I would call an old-fashioned summer evening when it still seemed light and warm way after 10.30pm. We also thought how lucky we were that balers had been invented as the older farm workers, when younger, had experienced gathering the hay by hand with rakes and pitchforks. They would rake the hay into small tumps called havcocks which were built to protect the hay if there was a rain shower. The hay was then loaded with pitchforks onto horse drawn drays and taken back to the farmyard where a haystack was built. It's a good job Fi hadn't forgotten how to load hay on a trailer when Sarah Wherry from Rosses Lane invited us for a quick drink one nice evening and John Pearsall was invited as well, we arrived to find 200 bales in the field to get into the barn! Sarah said you can have a drink when the last bale is in, she knew the offer of a drink would get us up there! We enjoyed our bit of hay hauling as we have big bales now so don't get to do any at home. I must admit, when we were finished, we had a very welcome drink with Simon and Sarah while listening to some of John's stories. I hope you are all keeping well, I must get back to the veg patch!

#### **Sticky Topped Ginger Cake Topping**

50g butter; 25g soft brown sugar; 1x15ml spoon golden syrup; 50g flaked almonds; 50g glacé cherries; chopped 25g stem ginger, chopped.

#### Method

Warm butter, brown sugar and syrup in a pan until sugar melts. Add cherries, almonds and stem ginger. Pour into a well greased 1kg loaf tin.

Cake 100g SR flour, 1 x 5ml spoon baking powder, 2 x 5ml spoons ground ginger, 100g caster sugar, 2 eggs and 100g soft margarine. Beat cake ingredients together in the one-stage method. Carefully pour over the topping in the tin. Bake at 180C/350F/Gas Mark 4 for 40-45 mins until firm to the touch. Turn out whilst still warm. Best wishes to you all and happy baking!

# Martley CE Primary School

The past few months have for been challenging everyone; Martley Primary School and Pre-School has not escaped these issues. Initially we formed a 'hub' of three schools based Broadheath CE Primary. this also included pupils from Clifton Primary. This arrangement worked very well with staff from all

three schools providing childcare and education for the children of Key Workers. Our hub of schools, one of the first to be organised, remained working together throughout the 'holiday' periods and provided care on Bank Holidays. The support from staff has been tremendous and has led to an even stronger relationship between the Teachers, as many of you will know, have also been challenged with providing lessons for home learning. Some teachers became video stars and recorded daily bedtime stories; others recorded short lessons and all were engaged with marking and responding to children's work. This has been an enormous task for parents at home as well, as many have been juggling supporting their children with activities at home, whilst still attending countless Zoom meetings and answering telephone calls from work! As school, we fully appreciate the problems faced and are extremely grateful for your support in maintaining meaningful educational opportunities. Some of the children (and parents!) have clearly had lots of fun creating videos and completing problems set. The quality of the work produced at home has been very good indeed and the teachers have enjoyed reading it using the online platform 'Seesaw'. This platform has enabled us to keep a record of pupil engagement and has been a two-way conversation between children and staff. As time progressed, the three schools have all opened in some way to more pupils. Logistical arrangements such as only being able to have around 10 pupils in a classroom and some staff working from home has meant we have not been able to accommodate as many children as we would ideally have liked. We have completed several detailed risk assessments and have removed from the classrooms a great deal of furniture and other items in order to allow social distancing for the children and for surfaces to be cleaned more easily. Currently the school hall resembles a furniture showroom after a tornado has struck. We are surrounded by tables, chairs. soft furnishings. redundant computer equipment and many more items. During 'lockdown' we had a minor flood in one of the classrooms which has resulted in an insurance claim for new carpets and many books and other items. With all of the carpet manufacturers closed this was more difficult than usual. The insurance company even attempted a remote assessment of the damage – they hadn't made allowances for the internet connection in Martley and this ended up in an old-fashioned telephone description of the damage caused.

The children who have returned to school have been wonderful – they have settled in brilliantly and have accepted the new 'normal' without question. Handwashing is a regular occurrence and even the

littlest children move happily across the 2 metre spots on the floor. Children's desks are set 2 metres apart and we are spending as much time as possible teaching and learning outside whilst remaining in our 'bubbles' or groups of children. Thankfully we have experienced some lovely weather to make this a more pleasant time or the staff and children.

We have become very used to daily DFE (Department for Education) updates and the copious guidance documents from the government; each document links to containing several other guidance documents! Often it seemed that the advice seemed conflicting but we are grateful that we belong to a trust Diocese of Worcester Multi-Academy Trust) with the same ethos and commitment as ourselves. Constant communication across the two schools. Martley and Broadheath, has been maintained and it has helped to be able to share out the reading responsibilities. We are now busy carefully reading the guidance related to the 'full re-opening'

of schools in September. This too is

proving a challenge as we try to arrange staggered start times, moving furniture back into classrooms and try do our very best to follow all safety guidelines. We are all keen to have the children back in school and look forward to hearing their happy voices around school; even if singing in large groups is still currently not allowed! It has been a very different start to the new leadership structure of Mr Hackley as Executive Headteacher of Martley and Broadheath, and Mrs Cox as Head of School at Martley, than the one we had planned. It has though, proved to be a very positive experience as we have had the opportunity to work closely as a team with the support of Mrs Randall as Head of School at Broadheath. It has also enabled subject leaders in both schools to begin to look at their subjects collaboratively and we plan to develop this more in the future. Our traditional 'goodbye' to the Year 6 pupils has also been very different this year; the last two terms have been especially challenging. The usual planned activities have not possible due to government restrictions and we have all missed the chance to wish them well in the future. We are not sure if the children were happy or not about not having to sit their SATS! Hopefully we will be able to plan a get together in September where we can bid a proper farewell to these pupils who have contributed so much in their time at Martley CE Primary School. The Year 6 Leavers have contributed much to the school over their years here, we will their sporting prowess; their academic endeavours but most of all their individual strengths and talents. I am sure that they will go on to achieve many great things as they make their

journey through life. On a different note, we bid a sad farewell to Mrs Linda Darby who, has been helping to educate the children of Martley CE Primary School for over 18 years. She has shown tireless dedication to the school and has been part of the lives of countless families. Mrs Darby is leaving us to spend more time doing her favourite activities such as sailing and gardening. As yet, we have been unable to get together to celebrate her time with us but we will be inviting back for a socially distanced celebration as soon as we are able. I am sure that those of you that know her will wish Linda all the best for the future; may the wind always carry her in the right direction.

#### Voices

August is the month we Shakespeareans will experiment with a Zoom rendition of Macbeth. The project is not without its potential pitfalls. Managing cues and reducing background noise are high on the list of requirements for success. Hopefully our inexperience will not spoil our pleasure in speaking the memorable Macbeth is an words of the play. atmospheric play. It often introduces the Witches with claps of thunder and flashes of lightning. The Weird sisters begin their sinister chanting as if imitating the devil's messengers arriving from Hell to beckon Macbeth to his eventual doom. Shakespeare probably copied the idea from Marlowe's Dr. Faustus. The doctor is tempted by Mephistopheles (the Devil's messenger) to enjoy a life of pleasure in return for his immortal soul. Ultimately in the spectacular final scene he is dragged down to Hell. Marlowe's Faustus was popular and profitable in Shakespeare's time and by adopting a similar motif Shakespeare encouraged the punters to his theatre, the Globe, and helped to fill his coffers. Because of this motif, the opening scene is important, and most

people are familiar with the notion of Witches in Macbeth even if they know little of the play. Shakespeare has made them memorable by adopting a particular approach to the verses and consequently the vocalisation of their words. The Witches speak in a poetry form called tetrameter, which is a kind of chanted verse with strong rhymes and a regular beat. We hear the line 'Double, double toil and trouble/ Fire burn and cauldron bubble.'! This is a spell which relies on our fascination with the supernatural. We all know what is going on, the Witches are conjuring visions of evil magic. But it is the way the words are spoken and the stylisation of the voices that makes the sinister scene work. An actor's voice is his or her most important instrument. The meaning and atmosphere are conveyed not only by the written words but by the way they are enunciated and by the pitch and timbre of the voice. Spoken words are not the only conveyors of meaning; facial expression, gesture and body language complete the picture. During Lockdown we were confined to a great deal of spoken communication via the telephone. I know that some manage to use Facetime and Zoom and similar platforms but the majority resort to speech. Although we don't wish to act, it makes sense to consider the important contribution all of our senses make in communicating meaning to another person - hearing, sight, touch and smell all play their parts. When we are confined to one sense it's worth giving a thought to advice given to actors enunciation, timbre and pitch and how they help to convey meaning. It is all too easy to be misunderstood if you cannot be seen. Listen to a radio play and you will get the idea. Sometimes spoken words are a little more exaggerated, stressed and repeated so as to make the point or to confirm meaning.

Our attempt to read the play on Zoom does include vision which will help. However, speakers will be reading their parts and the tops of heads are not very expressive, so the task is a challenge. I will report back next time and let you know how we got on. In the meantime, bear some of these thoughts in mind when speaking on the telephone and enjoy dramatizing your conversations. Do stay well everyone.

#### Speeding

There has been a sharp increase in vehicles speeding along the main street of the village and along Venn Lane. Just because there are fewer vehicles on the road currently, this does **not** mean an increase in speed is in any way safe.

Vehicles are not slowing down until well after the 30mph limit, if at all! Venn Lane may not have a 30 mph limit but it is a meandering road with blind bends. Please drive as though you were about to meet;

Two riders on horseback; or

A parent with a push-chair; or

A pensioner taking their dog out or a band of cyclists; or

A group of children out for a walk.

There has been an active discussion within the village of solutions to the problem. The suggestion of requesting speed bumps has been ruled out, as too damaging, especially to emergency vehicles and house foundations. The Parish Council have requested a 40 mph limit buffer ahead of the 30mph zone and speed camera units to track actual speeds. If volunteers come forward, there is training available to have a community speed watch, which the village could then use at those times when speeding is most prevalent. # Recipe for the month 'EASY ONE-CRUST PIE'

You will not need a normal baking tin.

Just a solid baking sheet, lightly greased (so it saves a little on the washing up).

For the shortcrust pastry:

6 oz (175 g) plain flour;

3 oz (40 g) butter or margarine, at room temperature;

Cold water.

The choice of fruit is yours. I've always used plums and they work well.

#### For the Filling

1 and a half lb (700 g) prepared fruit (plums, rhubarb, gooseberries, cherries, peaches, apricots, raspberries etc. – whatever takes your fancy);

3 oz (75 g) caster sugar;

2 rounded tablespoons of semolina;

1 small egg yolk;

#### For the Glaze

1 small egg white;

6 sugar cubes, crushed;

And don't forget your lightly greased baking-sheet.

(You probably have your own recipe for shortcrust pastry but I have included one here – just in case)

#### To make the pastry

Sift the flour into a large mixing-bowl. Rub the fat into it lightly with your fingertips.

When the mixture is like crumbs, sprinkle in enough cold water to bring it together to a smooth dough that leaves the bowl absolutely clean — with no crumbs left.

Give the pastry a little light knead to bring it fully together.

Place the pastry in a polythene bag in the fridge for 30 min.

Then

Pre-heat oven to gas mark 6, 400F (200C).

Roll the pastry out to approximately 14

inches (35 cm). As you roll it, give it quarter turns so that it ends up as round as possible – but don't worry about ragged edges. Carefully roll the pastry round the rolling-pin and transfer it to the centre of the lightly greases baking sheet.

To prevent the pastry getting soggy from excess juice, paint the base with egg yolk (cover about 10 inch (25 cm) circle in the centre), then lightly sprinkle the semolina over this. The semolina absorbs juices. The egg forms a waterproof coating. Pile the prepared fruit in the centre of the pastry, sprinkling it with sugar as you go.

Turn in the edges of the pastry – if any breaks, just patch it on again – it's meant to be ragged and rustic looking.

Brush the pastry surface all round with the egg white, then crush the sugar cubes with a rolling pin and sprinkle over the pastry.

Bake for about 35 minutes (on the highest shelf of the oven) or until the crust is golden-brown. Remove from oven and serve warm with crème fraiche or icecream.

This led to some patients being contacted from what appeared knightwick.surgery@nhs.net asking them to click on links within the email. As soon as we became aware of this, we updated the security details on the account, contacted all patients via text and reported it to all relevant organisations including the local Fraud Team, NHS Digital and our Data Protection Officer. After investigating the breach NHS Digital contacted all those directly affected with advice and the matter has now been reported to the Information Commissioners Office (ICO).

We will never ask you to follow links from an email without discussing this with you first. If you receive any emails you are unsure about, **please do not** open attachments or links without checking with us first.

NHS Test and Trace calls you by phone, the service will be using a single phone number 0300 0135 000. The only website the service will ask you to visit is

www.contact-tracing.phe.gov.uk./

Contact tracers will never:

Ask you to dial a premium rate number to speak to us (for example, those starting 09 or 087);

Ask you to make any form of payment; Ask for any details about your bank account;

Ask for your social media identities or login details, or those of your contacts; Ask you for any passwords or PINs, or ask you to set up any passwords or PINs over the phone;

community which has left its warehouse bursting at the seams.

The charity has been swamped with more than 30 tonnes of donations since the start of April after people rallied behind its efforts to support the growing number of households impacted by the coronavirus outbreak.

Two-thirds of the donated supplies have already been swallowed up with volunteers feeding just over 1,000 people in April alone – making it the second busiest month since food bank opened its doors 8 years ago.

But manager Grahame Lucas said the

outpouring of support had left the charity in a much stronger position to deal with the economic slump which is expected to follow the lifting of lockdown.

Mr Lucas added: "Lockdown may have kept us apart but the community has stood together to tackle hunger and make sure those at the sharp end of this crisis get the lifeline they need."

"In many ways this crisis has brought out the best in us but we know there is no room for complacency and for some people the hardship is only just beginning." The surge in donations has been fuelled by a wave of street collections organised to coincide with the Clap for Carers on Thursday nights. The idea was originally inspired by Worcester City FC Chairman Steve Goode and has spread like wildfire

across the city. But the groundswell of support had left the charity struggling to find space to store new supplies until neighbouring Freedom Church stepped in to provide some temporary storage.




